Saint Peter Claver (1581-1654)

f you've ever brought someone into the Church, you'll appreciate the tremendous zeal of St. Peter Claver who baptized an estimated 300,000 people during thirty-three years of devoted missionary service in South Born near Barcelona, America. Spain, into a prosperous farming family, he grew up some seventy years after King Ferdinand of Spain first authorized the purchase of 250 Africans to serve as slaves in Spain's new colonies in the Americas. He was blessed with parents who demonstrated to the impressionable boy the goodness that sprang from their Catholic Faith.

As a young Spanish Jesuit priest, Peter left his homeland in 1610 to minister to slaves who poured by the thousands into what was then the center of the slave trade, now Columbia. As each ship arrived at port, Peter would enter its infested and crowded quarters to minister to the ill-treated and exhausted passengers. He dispensed medicines, food, brandy and tobacco along with instructions in the Faith, assuring the passengers of their human dignity even while their masters exposed them cruelly to the public, like chained animals.

His preaching was believable and took root because, avoiding the hospitality of the planters, Peter chose to live in most wretched quarters with the slaves. He died in 1654 and was canonized in 1888. Pope Leo XIII designated him the worldwide patron of missionary work among black slaves.
