Mary Virginia Merrick (1866 – 1955)


In spite of being partially paralyzed and in pain from age 14 until her death at 88, Mary Virginia Merrick was a woman of courage and of accomplishment, a witness of Gospel love. She was born in Washington, D.C., on November 2, 1866. After a spinal injury, Mary Virginia was confined to bed or a wheelchair. She was sustained by her family and friends and by her ever-deepening love of the Christ Child. "I resolved to do something every day for the Christ Child," she wrote in her autobiography. She was also determined to see the Christ Child in every child and not to speak about her sufferings. Instead she asked her teenage friends to go out and look for a need that they could fill. It came in the form of an expectant mother who had no clothes for the

newborn. Mary Virginia with others made a layette for her. This layette, a gesture of love and caring, became the seed and the signature task of the Christ Child Society she founded 125 years ago. Today the National Christ Child Society with more than 6000 members is dedicated to helping children and families in need.

As stated in Mary Virginia's eulogy, "She took her cross and out of it fashioned a bridge over which she and others could walk on their way to God." Mary Virginia was declared a Servant of God in 2003, and her cause for canonization was opened in 2011.
