This festive day is so joyous that there is sometimes even dancing in the street! The cycle of readings is immediately and endlessly repeated. Pick up the Good Book today and every day.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 5:21-33; Luke 13:18-21 (480). "What is the kingdom of God like? To what can I compare it?"

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 26 Come on in

During this year, the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy which ends on November 20, Catholics have the opportunity to pass through special holy doors of mercy, designated at cathedrals and



major churches all over the world, and receive an indulgence for the remission of sin. By symbolically opening a door and walking through it, you show that you seek God's boundless compassion and forgiveness and that you will find it in Christ. Enter the holy doors at a church near you before the Year of Mercy is out—and invite others to come along.

TODAY'S READINGS: Ephesians 6:1-9; Luke 13:22-30 (481). "Lord, open the door for us."

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 27 Healing power of prayer

When it comes to your health, you can always turn to the saints for help. In fact, there are many saints who are known to intercede on behalf of the sick for particular ailments and conditions. About to have surgery? Ask Saint Luke the Evangelist. Suffering from arthritis? Invoke Saint Alphonsus Ligouri. Have a headache? Entreat Saint Teresa of Avila. Catholics also have a sacrament for healing: Anointing of the Sick. No matter the physical outcome, remember that the primary purpose of your prayers is for spiritual healing, comfort, and courage.

demons and I perform healings today and tomorrow, and on the third day I accomplish my purpose."

FEAST OF SIMON AND JUDE, APOSTLES
How can I help you, pray tell?

We don't know a lot about the life of Saint Jude, one of the apostles, but people often turn to him for intercession in "hopeless causes." A friend in need is a friend indeed, so be that kind of friend for those in need in your own life. When they ask for help, find a way to respond. You can't do everything for them, but as Jesuit Daniel Berrigan once said, "No one can do everything, but everyone can do something." Take Saint Jude as your inspiration and find a way to bring hope to the hopeless.

Today's readings: Ephesians 2:19-22; Luke 6:12-16 (666). "Jesus went up to the mountain to pray, and he spent the night in prayer to God."

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 29 Glory is a holy mystery

The death of boxer and social agitator Muhammad Ali this year touched admirers worldwide. The achievements of men and women like Ali are greater than the sum of their defeats. While the self-proclaimed "Greatest" was a phenomenon at his sport, Ali did more to raise the consciousness of Americans to the racism that permeated his generation.
