Evangelization: Collaboration of Priests and Laity

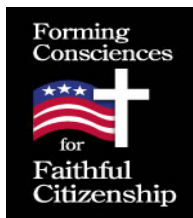
That within parishes, priests and lay people may collaborate in service to the community without giving in to the temptation of discouragement.
