All of our parishes participated in the "Year of Faith" while observing the 50th anniversary of the Second Vatican Council and the 20th anniversary of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Special activities included presentations focusing on the Catechism of the Catholic Church, the documents of Vatican II, and on the saints, as well as celebrating parish missions and special devotions.

Also of note, a Diocesan-wide celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation was held in February in every parish across the Diocese and hundreds of people participated in the celebration of this wonderful sacrament. bringing reconciliation and peace to the hearts of people. In this coming March, the Diocesanwide celebration of Reconciliation will be held again. During the summer there were pilgrimage opportunities within our diocese where hundreds of people took advantage by visiting and spending time in each of the five parishes. I truly believe the Year of Faith has brought many people in our parishes closer to Jesus Christ, thus, better able to live their relationship with Him.

This year also saw the realization of the Diocesan-wide parish based, "Rooted in Faith, Forward in Hope" capital campaign. Rooted in Faith - Forward in Hope Campaign shows Diocesan commitment

More than \$170 million in funds were raised in support of the historic Rooted in Faith -Forward in Flope campaign. With a goal of \$125 million, the success of the Campaign demonstrates the Catholic commitment to the Northeast Ohio community.

Launched in the fall of 2000, the Campaign. inspired posters, parochial vicars and parish volunteers to mise funds from thousands of Northeast Ohio Catholics. The funds will support five specific long-term initiatives through the Catholic Community Foundations

- · Strengthening Our Parishes: Recognize the importance of the funds donated from each perish and that a vibrant parish life is central to connecting parishioners to the Catholic Church.
- · Strengthening Our Faith: Build faiththrough evangelization and connecting people to the Catholic Church with multimedia outreach to the community: support sacramental preparation, religious education and faith formation for youth and adults; invest in parishes with limited financial resources and urgent needs to ensure the continuation of a Catholic presence in the community.
- · Catholic Education: Increase tuition endowment to assist families and children with the costs of Catholic education. potentially helping an additional 2,000 children annually; allocate funds to support innovative programs designed to enhance curriculum, facilities and technology.
- Those Who Serve: Increase the current Priestly Formation Endowment to support seminarian education; provide funding for the training of priests for diocesan. service and for the formation and education of diaconate candidates; allocate funds to the current Retirement Plan for

those who have spent a lifetime in service to the Diocesan community.

Charitable Works: Achieve initiatives above and beyond the capabilities of the Annual Appeal, which supports Catholic Charities' operating needs; fund expansion programs, acquisition of new sites and the renovation of existing facilities to more effectively assist Northeast Chicars.

As of September 30, 2013, nearly \$46 million had been distributed to support parish needs, faith formation programs, tuition assistance, academic innovation and technology programs, priestly formation and retirement funds and Catholic Charities' expansions and renovations. In the spring of 2013, over \$1.8 million was distributed to 66 schools to provide funding for facilities penovations, technology enhancements and curriculum enrichment.

FINANCIAL MISCONDUCT HOTLINE

The Carholic Diocese of Cleveland sponsors a Diocesan Financial Misconduct Hotling. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2013 nine seports were received and investigated. This reporting mechanism allows Catholic Diocese of Cleveland employees, purish employees, volunteers, vendors. parishioners, or any interested party to report concerns about suspected financial irregularities. Report of Chief Financial Officer

In a continuing spirit of accountability and transparency. I am pleased to share this



financial information with the people of the Discose of Cleveland. The financial results in the accompanying table are summarized from the audited financial statements of the Central

Administration Office of the Discuss of Cleveland (CAO), which received an unqualified opinion from our outside auditors and are available on our website (www.discessoficleveland.org/finance).

The CAO serves parishes and other Diocesan organizations by providing program, financial and administrative support. The CAO does not include the separate operating entities in the Diocese: the seminaries, cometeries, Catholic Charities, Diocesan-owned schools. Facilities Services, and the Catholic Community Foundation, nor the operations of any parishes. Further information regarding the separate operating entities is available on the Discosan website and the individual parish financial information is presented locally to its parishioners.

During the past few years, the Diocese underwent a reconfiguration that resulted in the closure or merging of selected parishes. In total, the Diocese has sold 39 closed parish facilities, and \$10.3 million in net proceeds has now been distributed to parishes in the Diocese. Further \$2.7 million has been contributed to the Parish Assistance Fund, which will be used solely for the benefit of Diocesan parishes suffering from financial hardship or unexpected needs that are beyond their financial means. Further information regarding parish sales activities is available on the Diocesan website.

As noted in the table on page 3, offertory collections continue to be stable despite the economic challenges that exist in Northeast Ohio. Assessment collections by the CAO totaling \$54.6 million, which are determined by the level of parish offertory. seere also stable as parishes continue to be timely with their remittances in support of Diocesan ministries and activities. Contributions primarily reflect the receipts from the Rooted-in-Faith campaign that are specifically related to activities that are managed through the CAO, mainly training and education of priests, parish support. and evangelization programs. Investment market results were strong in FY 2013. The net assets transferred to unrestricted status support seminary operations. priest education, infirmed priests. communications programs, and other CAO activities.

Expenses in the CAO include personnel and other direct costs incurred to deliver its services and subsidies to other Diocesan entities. Operating expenses also include the net impact of consolidation and closure costs and gains on the disposal of facilities owned by the Diocese. The CAO expects these latter net costs to decline significantly now that a substantial number of the closed parish proporties have been sold.

I want to publicly thank the members of the Diocesan Finance Council for the support they provide to the Bishop and the CAO and extend that appreciation to Catholics throughout the Diocese. The continuing generosity of the Catholic community and the sharing of time, talent, and treasure make possible the good works of our Church in the Diocese of Cleveland.
