Blessed Teresa of Calcutta (1910–1997)

Is there anyone who hasn't heard of Blessed Teresa of Calcutta? This diminutive sister, originally from Albania, was a powerhouse of love. Named eighteen times in the Gallup poll of the ten most admired women, Mother Teresa is known for devotion to the poorest of the poor.

At age eighteen Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu joined the missionary Sisters of Loreto. For almost twenty years she ministered at schools in India. Then she heard the call to leave the convent and serve the poor while living with them. In 1948, Sister Teresa became a citizen of India, opened a school in Calcutta, and helped the destitute in slums. Women joined her, and in 1950, the religious congregation of the Missionaries of Charity was born. Its mission was to care for people who are shunned, including those dying on the streets, those suffering from AIDS, orphans,

alcoholics, lepers, and the disabled. Soon Mother Teresa's Sisters in their blue-bordered white habit were a familiar sight in numerous countries, particularly in time of war or natural disasters. The Missionaries of Charity Brothers and a contemplative branch of Sisters were founded in 1963, followed by organizations for lay people and Missionaries of Charity Fathers.

In 1979, Mother Teresa was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. Typically, she asked that the money earmarked for the congratulatory banquet be donated to India's poor instead.

Beginning a new ministry was extremely difficult. Moreover, Mother Teresa struggled with faith for almost fifty years. Nothing, however, deterred her from being “Mother” to the unloved of the world. She was beatified in 2003.
